"My soul is in the sky." William Shakespeare

When I was a student and first went to theatre, I climbed many stairs high up into the balcony to the only seat I could afford. Though the actors were the size of postage stamps, and I saw only the tops of their heads, I could enter the imaginations of great authors such as Shakespeare through language. The sky, indeed, was not the limit, and the stories lifted me into worlds far away from the ordinary. The seat was cheap, but the experience priceless. For a few hours, I soared free. And, when the play was over, and I went back

down, I sometimes left a different person than when I came in.

THEATRE FOR A NEW AUDIENCE began in 1979 as a modern classical theatre with one constant guide, William Shakespeare, whom we produce alongside other major playwrights from the world repertoire ... a dialogue spanning centuries.

INIMITABLE VOICES, this

third season in our first permanent home, Polonsky Shakespeare Center, consists of four works by Shakespeare and major American and European authors:

RICHARD MAXWELL'S *ISOLDE*, a New York City Players production, written and directed by Richard Maxwell, a haunting and humorous exploration of what is real;

SHAKESPEARE'S *PERICLES*, with music composed by Shaun Davey and directed by Trevor Nunn, a fantastic adventure and story of redemption, reconciliation, and forgiveness;

IBSEN'S A DOLL'S HOUSE adapted by Thornton Wilder and STRINDBERG'S THE

FATHER, in a new version in English by David Greig, alternating investigations of marriage and the battle of the sexes performed in repertory featuring John Douglas Thompson and directed by Arin Arbus.

These authors couldn't be more different; what connects them is the shaping of extraordinary theatrical worlds with singular language—all on the uniquely flexible Scripps Mainstage, an intimate theatrical space with superb sight lines, seats and acoustics.

BAM, Mark Morris and BRIC and accessible by car, bus, subway, and LIRR. Designed by Hugh Hardy, our building has won major architectural awards and been described as "not only an architectural gem, but a major cultural hub" (Daily News).



NEW YORK CITY PLAYERS'



Isolde is a new American play about memory, identity, the ephemeral, and infidelity, written and directed by Richard Maxwell. In the play, inspired by the legend of Tristan and Isolde, the marriage of Patrick and Isolde appears to be happy. Patrick is the owner of a successful construction company and Isolde is a star actress. But Isolde finds herself increasingly unable to remember her lines. When she decides to build her dream house, her husband is eager to help. But the project is jeopardized by Massimo, an award-winning architect whom Isolde hires.

Isolde was developed in part at Theater Basel, where it received its first production in September 2013, and was later presented at La Filature in Mulhouse, France and at Abrons Arts Center in New York City.



WHAT IS POSSIBLE?




Pericles, one of Shakespeare's late plays, combines a fantastic adventure (a hero wandering, Odysseus-like, the world of the Aegean) with a story of a miracle. Live music will help convey the play's mystery and magic. The Irish artist Shaun Davey (with whom Trevor Nunn worked on his film of Twelfth Night) will compose. This is the first time that Trevor Nunn will have directed Pericles and staged Shakespeare with a U.S. company.

Trevor Nunn is a director of theatre, film, television, and opera. A four-time Tony and Olivier Award-winner, he is former Artistic Director of Great Britain's Royal Shakespeare Company (1968–1986) and Royal National Theatre (1996–2003). Trevor Nunn is renowned for productions of Shakespeare, authors from the world repertoire including *The Life and Adventures of Nicholas Nickleby*, and contemporary drama, such as numerous plays by Tom Stoppard. He also staged some of the most successful musicals of our time, including *Cats*, *Les Misérables*, *Starlight Express*, *Sunset Boulevard*, and *Woman in White*, as well as films *Hedda*, *Lady Jane*, and *Twelfth Night*. Trevor Nunn's most recent production in New York was in 2013 – Samuel Beckett's *All That Fall*

BY HENRIK IBSEN ADAPTED BY THORNTON WILDER FEATURING JOHN DOUGLAS THOMPSON DIRECTED BY ARIN ARBUS

Arin Arbus, TFANA Associate Artistic Director, will direct two provocative contemporary classics about marriage in rotating repertory - Henrik Ibsen's *A Doll's House*, in an adaptation by Thornton Wilder not seen in New York since its Broadway premiere in 1937, and August Strindberg's *The Father* in a new version in English by David Greig, commissioned by TFANA. Strindberg wrote *The Father* as a direct rebuttal to Ibsen's *A Doll's House*, fulminating against Ibsen's tale of a woman bravely escaping a stifling bourgeois marriage. This is the first time the two plays will be performed in repertory.

John Douglas Thompson returns to TFANA to play Torvald in *A Doll's House* and the Captain in *The Father*.

At TFANA, Arin Arbus has staged Shakespeare's King Lear, Much Ado About Nothing, The Taming of the Shrew, Macbeth, Measure for Measure, and Othello. She staged Britten's The Rape of Lucretia at Houston Grand Opera and La Traviata at the Lyric Opera of Chicago.

John Douglas Thompson returns following acclaimed performances in TFANA's Tamburlaine the Great (Obie and Drama Desk Awards), Macbeth, and Othello (Obie, Lucille Lortel, and Joe A. Callaway Awards). Mr. Thompson has appeared on Broadway in A Time To Kill, Cyrano de Bergerac, and Julius Caesar. Other off-Broadway credits include The Iceman Cometh, Satchmo at the Waldorf, and The Emperor Jones. Mr. Thompson is a recipient of the Scripps Award, Fox Fellowship, and Robert Brustein Award.
