Welcome to Theatre for a New Audience's fourth season in our new home, Polonsky Shakespeare Center, Brooklyn Cultural District.

Last season, all four TFANA productions were **Critics' Picks** by *The New York Times* and *Time Out:* New York City Players' ISOLDE written and directed by **Richard Maxwell**; **Shakespeare's** PERICLES starring **Christian Camargo** and staged by **Trevor Nunn**; **Ibsen's** A DOLL'S HOUSE in repertory with **Strindberg's** THE FATHER starring **Maggie Lacey** and **John Douglas Thompson** and directed by **Arin Arbus**.

This season, TFANA presents four brilliant comedies—ageless dramas—that regard the comic as more than an occasion for hilarity. The plays are tales of coping with nearly overwhelming odds that make us laugh but also invite us to consider perseverance in surprising new ways:

THE SERVANT OF TWO MASTERS by Italian author **Carlo Goldoni** is about hunger. Written in 1745 in the style of *commedia dell'arte* and directed by **Christopher Bayes**, it features the extraordinary **Steven Epp** as the servant Truffaldino.

THE SKIN OF OUR TEETH by **Thornton Wilder**, directed by **Arin Arbus**, is a contemporary classic about the Antrobus family, whose existence, as well as humanity's, is threatened. Delightfully inventive, it is also a deeply moving story about the imperishable human spirit.

HAPPY DAYS by **Samuel Beckett** is a great modern drama. Buried up to her waist, Winnie, hilarious and heartbreaking, is played by two-time Academy Award winner **Dianne Wiest**. **Jarlath Conroy** is Willie, her husband. This acclaimed production originated at Yale Repertory Theatre, directed by **James Bundy**.

MEASURE FOR MEASURE, Shakespeare's late comedy, and perhaps his most contemporary work, will be staged by **Simon Godwin**, one of Britain's most exciting young directors. A Duke leaves a corrupt Vienna on the verge of collapse. He appoints Angelo, a judge with a reputation for severe justice, to govern. What follows is a disturbing and surprising collision of purity, hypocrisy and lust.

The Polonsky is a hive of activity. The 299-seat Samuel H. Scripps Mainstage and 50-seat Theodore C. Rogers Studio are uniquely flexible and intimate spaces, with superb acoustics, where artists reconfigure the relationship between the stage and the audience for each production. In The Studio, our program under the direction of Associate Artistic Director **Arin Arbus**, artists-in-residence develop innovative new projects.

TFANA's cornerstone is **Shakespeare**. **Peter Brook**, one of the great artists of our times, wrote, "Shakespeare has never been a dead author. At every epoch, in every culture, he is alive."

At TFANA, you will experience Shakespeare alongside major classical and contemporary plays with some of today's most exciting American and European artists. And, whether it's Shakespeare, rarely seen classics, or noteworthy contemporary playwrights such as **Branden Jacobs-Jenkins** and **Wallace Shawn**, these authors thrillingly illuminate ourselves, our society, and our times.

Written in 1745, The Servant of Two Masters is one of the great dramatist Carlo Goldoni's most popular plays, preserving in scripted form the antic energy, ribald humor and improvisational immediacy of the commedia dell'arte. Reviving The Servant of Two Masters demands masterly comic instincts, as the slapstick details of its immortally zany tale must be reinvented for every age. Christopher Bayes's and Steven Epp's hilarious adaptation has been hailed as the wittiest and cleverest English-language version in decades. These veterans of America's celebrated Theatre de la Jeune Lune company honor the legacy and tradition of commedia by rendering it utterly contemporary, relying on improvisation, original

music by Christopher Curtis and Aaron Halva, and a spirit of dauntless playfulness.

This production of *Servant* had its world premiere at Yale Repertory Theatre in 2010. It subsequently played at the Shakespeare Theatre, Washington D.C., and won a Helen Hayes Award for Steven Epp (Best Actor) and a Helen Hayes nomination for Christopher Bayes (Best Director). It has also played at the Guthrie Theater, Minneapolis (2012), ArtsEmerson, Boston (2013), and Seattle Rep (2013), garnering Elliot Norton Award nominations for Outstanding Production and Outstanding Actor. This will be the New York premiere.



THE STUDIO

The Studio offers residencies to a diverse range of theatre artists who support risk-taking, professional development, and experimentation. Authors explore new plays and translations, directors develop new productions, and actors work with master teachers on performing Shakespeare. This season's artists-in-residence are Tea Alagić, Christopher Bayes, Fiasco Theater, Jonathan Kalb, Taibi Magar, Danya Taymor, and Calvin Trillin.

At our free post-show TFANA Talks, members of the theatre's Council of Scholars lead conversations with artists such as Richard Maxwell, Christian Camargo, Trevor Nunn, John Douglas Thompson, Maggie Lacey, and Arin Arbus.

The conversation continues online, where our free 360° Viewfinder production guides offer original scholarly essays, illuminating contextual features, and exclusive in-depth interviews with the season's artists.

Each season also features a variety of free or low-cost public events with notable voices from the worlds of film, food, music, journalism, art and design. And our annual Open Books series welcomes authors of some of American theatre's most acclaimed new histories, biographies, and critical works.

Subscribers receive priority access to Humanities events and discounts at our book kiosk.

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
